

Riley K. Temple '71



Riley K. Temple is a partner in the Washington, D.C. law firm of Halprin Temple, which he founded in 1993. He practices telecommunications law and has extensive experience in federal legislative and regulatory matters. He represents telecommunications clients before Congress, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and Executive Branch agencies.

Mr. Temple served as Assistant General Counsel at the Corporation for Public Broadcasting from 1974 to 1977, and from 1977 to 1978 as Legislative Assistant to U.S. Senator Charles McC. Mathias (R-MD). From 1978 to 1980 he was Senior Counsel to RCA Global Communications in New York City, and from 1980 to 1983 he served as Communications Counsel to the U.S. Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation. During this period he was an Oliver Cromwell Cox lecturer at the John F. Kennedy

School of Government at Harvard University in Cambridge, Massachusetts. Before entering private practice in 1985, Temple was Assistant Vice President for Communications Policy at Bell Communications Research, Inc.

Mr. Temple also serves as Board President for the True Colors Theatre Company, a national black theater company based in Atlanta, GA, which he co-founded with Artistic Director Kenny Leon. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of Lafayette College in Easton, Pennsylvania, serves as its Secretary and served as Chair of its 2004 Presidential Search Committee. He has also endowed Lafayette's David L., Sr. and Helen J. Temple Scholarship for Study Abroad and Visiting Lecture Series in Africana Studies. Mr. Temple is a member of the Community and Friends Board of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, a member of the National Archives Foundation, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Smithsonian Museum of American History and a member of the Federal Advisory Committee to the FCC on Diversity in the Digital Age and Chair of its New Technologies Sub-Committee. He is a past President and former Board member of Arena Stage and the Whitman-Walker Clinic. He has also served on the Boards of WETA, the Legal Aid Society of the District of Columbia, the Ellington Fund of the Duke Ellington School of the Arts, the Green Door, the Corcoran Board of Overseers and the DC Commission on National & Community Service. Mr. Temple served as a member of the District of Columbia Bar's Task Force on Sexual Orientation and the Legal Workplace and is a 1990 Graduate of Leadership Washington. He also is an emeritus member of the Board of Directors of the Human Rights Campaign, and the Washington Theatre Awards Society (the "Helen Hayes Awards"). Finally, he is a member of the Vestry of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Temple received his A.B. degree in 1971 from Lafayette College, and his J.D. degree from Georgetown University in 1974.

Mr. Temple is a member of the Federal Communications Bar Association and is admitted to practice in Virginia and the District of Columbia.
